- Tween Hangout was attended by 51 preteens who painted pet rocks, made hot cocoa ornaments, and joined in a coloring party.

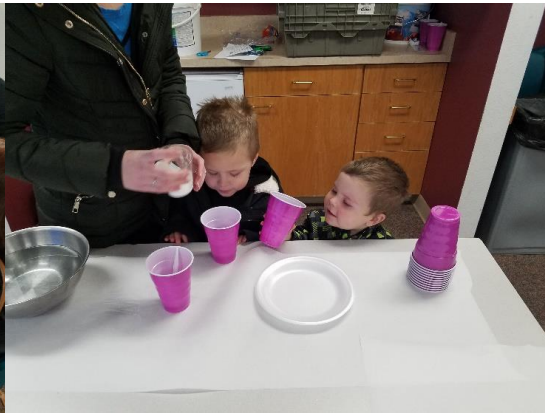


Tweens: Pet Rock Creations

- Saturday's Family Program was attended by 20 kids and their caregiver to create snow and decorate Elsa tiaras and snowflake wands. Seven stayed to view the



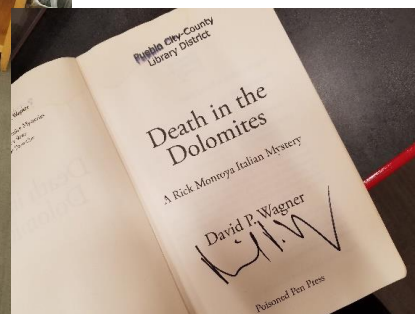
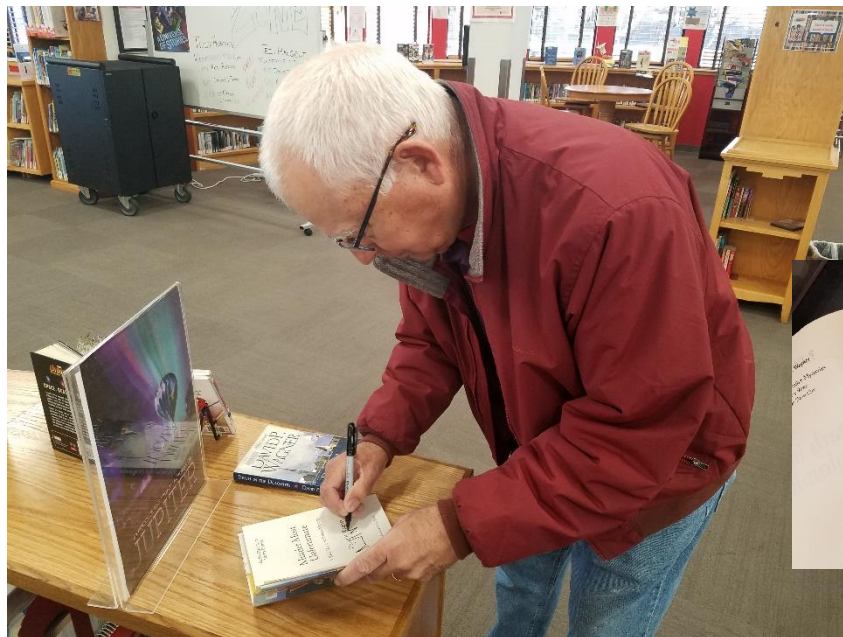

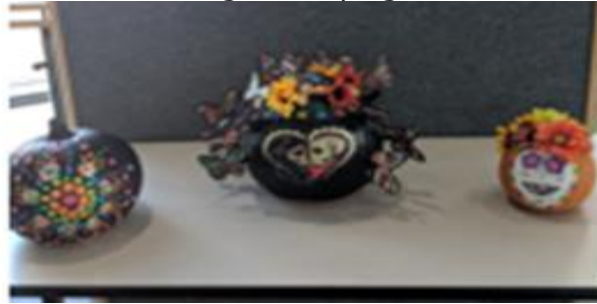

I continue to visit Pueblo Diversified Industries to provide Maker programs and outreach, this time teaching the clients to make Thanksgiving crafts for centerpieces. We also hosted our first Conversation Café program, which happened due to feedback from a senior focus group we hosted in August. We had 14 attendees for our first evening. Finally, we have bought and installed a laser cutter and engraver in the Idea Factory and are in the process of learning the best ways to use it. Stay tuned!
