## Public Service and Collection Development

- 397 items were counted used in Special Collections.

- Tabitha Davis is continuing to work on John Korber's business binders. She has completed the reorganization of the
  approximately 80 volumes of John Korber's business binders and has completed the index for the first nine volumes.
- Tabitha Davis is still updating the online obituary database. She has uploaded 5,861 files and has prepared 12,767 more files to be uploaded. She is proofreading the 2011 obituary list and is manually entering the names from 1914 into the online database.

A letter of support was written by the PCCLDs director, Jon Walker, for a grant application to continue activities to promote this project. An article appeared in the Pueblo Chieftain on Saturday April 27.

Finally, 3D printing continues to be exciting as this month the Dremel printer was used to help engineering students at CSU-Pueblo print their final designs for their senior project- in this case, the body and arms of a prototype drone.

- YS-Sponsored Program Attendance year over year:
