Finally, we are very excited for the Creative Aging classes in September, with Kate Fox being our first Presenting Artist with a focus on pottery!

Special Event

 - On 8/31, PCCLD hosted the inaugural Southern Colorado ADA Symposium with over 150 people in attendance. This event featured an opening session about the history of the ADA and the independent living movement with Dawn Russell from Denver's Atlantis ADAPT and Kristen Castor from Colorado Cross Disability Coalition. Additionally, participants had 15 breakout sessions to choose from, a vendor fair featuring 25 area agencies, film screenings, an interactive simulation room and a keynote luncheon sponsored by the Colorado Trust with comedian and author Nina G. A generous gift from the Friends of the Library also provided captioning and ASL interpretive services for the event. Gains and Losses:

- This year's largest decreases came from children's and teen kits. Last year's Winnie the Pooh party was quite popular, and Pueblo West has been using primarily their own gaming system rather than YS teen kits.
- The single biggest increase came from widespread branch use of the Outreach Kit at summer and back-to-school events. Luckily, this kit has been funded by the Friends of the Library again! Behind the scenes, YS CSR Magi Wren worked hard to create a calendar of back to school events that was shared with the YSC to facilitate and coordinate back to school outreach.

 - o 277% increase

Gains and Losses:

- The greatest gains in this category came from Outreach attendance and the Party in the Park. As previously mentioned, Magi Wren's work on the back-to-school calendar helped YS staff get ahead of school visits. Also, Books in the Park ran for the first two weeks of August, with an attendance of 508.
- The Party in the Park and Kids Parade was a very successful collaboration between YS, CR and Parks and Rec, resulting in an incredible end-of-summer bash with a total attendance of 1,200!
- Storytime attendance increased noticeably in all age categories, almost doubling Rawlings storytime attendance
 overall.
- In a milestone highlight Kirsten Dees, through collaboration with both EPIC and D60, has been able to ensure that there is a storytime visitor in every D60 preschool classroom!
