Introduction to Genealogy

What is Genealogy? In plain language, genealogy is the tracing of your family tree or the study of your ancestors and the lives they led.

Some researchers are curious about their family's history, would like to verify a family story, or join a lineage society. Students may have a history assignment "to do a family tree," or would like to work on a badge for Scouts. In each case, begin with yourself and chart the family members you know.

Each family member has a place on the family tree, but when traditions, family treasures, recipes, photographs and stories are added, you have a genealogy.

Three basic rules of genealogy will get you started and keep you on track: • Start with what you know and build on it.

Using an ancestor chart, write the names, dates of birth, death and marriage for as many ancestors as you can. Look for family bibles, scrapbooks, diaries, and newspaper clippings. Be sure names are complete, dates are written day, month, and complete year (ie. 31 July 1950), and places include city, county, state and/or country.

• Get organized early in your project.

A three-ring notebook containing paper, dividers, ancestor charts, and family group sheets is a good place to begin.

An ancestor chart is the equivalent of a road map in genealogy. When properly used, it tells the researcher what to search next. Two sets may be kept, a working copy to

take on research trips, and an archival copy for safe keeping.

• **Document, document, document.** Be sure to list the source of each piece of information on the chart.

records, military and

and tax records.

A Bright Future By Jon Walker

With this month's <u>Pueblo</u> <u>City-County Library District</u> <u>News & Events</u> newsletter, we unveil a new format with more articles plus full-color photographs and illustrations. This change represents another positive step for the Pueblo City-County Library District (PCCLD) and is part of an ongoing effort to enhance library services.

To help guide our future positive changes, we have embarked upon a long-range Library Strategic Planning Initiative.

We are developing our Strategic Plan to address how library services should develop in the county for the coming years. To guide us, we are using a standard professional guide entitled Planning for Results: A Public Library Transformation Process (ALA, 1998).

A committee of staff including the executive director, chief financial officer, community relations manager, Rawlings Library manager and others are leading the effort.

Members of the Library Board of Trustees are keeping abreast of the process. We also are involving other community stakeholders.

The Strategic Planning Initiative includes scanning the community, identifying community needs, scanning the library, measuring and evaluating PCCLD in comparison with peer libraries, determining community needs where the library can help, and articulating and writing goals and objectives to meet the needs to be addressed. We are examining the following in detail:

- The demographic makeup of Pueblo County (using Census data) and where growth is likely to occur (using city and county planning information)
- How Pueblo stacks up next to peer libraries in other communities (using sources such as the Library Research Service and the National Center for Education Statistics, both nationally recognized programs providing library statistics and research for library



- The fiscal circumstances of the Library District and how we can pay for library services in the future.
- Gathering and analyzing qualitative and quantitative data from citizen surveys and focus groups (conducted in accordance with the American Statistical Association guidelines) to help identify what services and library locations Pueblo County residents desire.

We began our planning activities in August and the Library Strategic Plan is on schedule to be completed in April 2005. The outcome will allow PCCLD to confidently look ahead to a bright future with a plan for responding best to Pueblo County's library service needs.

LIBRARY FACTS

In addition to the Robert Hoag Rawlings Public Library, the Pueblo City-County Library District (PCCLD) operates three full-service branch locations; the Barkman Branch in Belmont, the Lamb Branch on the south side, and the White Branch in Pueblo West.

Nine additional satellite libraries offer more limited hours, collections, and services. Eight satellites operate in schools, which include Risley Middle School, Cesar Chavez Academy, Avondale Elementary, Beulah School, North Mesa Elementary, Rye Elementary, South Mesa Elementary, and Vineland Elementary. The ninth satellite is located at the Community Center in Colorado City.

PCCLD's overall vital signs appear healthy. The number of materials checked out per capita is 6.63, the Library owns 2.75 volumes per capita, materials expenditures are \$5.23 per capita, and there are .47 staff per 1,000 served.

New Technology for Better Service

The library upgraded to three new digital microfilm scanners located on the 3rd Floor in the Special Collections area.

Researchers and genealogists will appreciate this new technology.

These new scanners replaced older analog reader-printers. Digital film reader-scanners are the wave of the future for

reading and capturing information from microfilm.

The Canon MS300 provides fast scanning speed, high resolution for clear images and a variety of delivery and storing features.

Information can be printed, saved to disc or emailed right from the desktop. This model selected has a userfriendly Scan Panel and will require far less maintenance and upkeep because prints will generate from laser printers.

Youth Services

Picture Books By Jane Palmer

The very first books patrons see when they enter Youth Services in the Rawlings Library are pictures books, thousands of them. Why so many?

Picture books are for everybody—children of all ages, parents, teachers, artists looking for visual images, buddy readers, tutors, people learning to read English or Spanish (Spanish picture-books are located in the Spanishlanguage area) and family pets. Pets make wonderful nonjudgmental listeners for beginning readers!

In picture books, the pictures help tell the story and are just as important as the text. Many children learn to tell the story through the pictures which act as visual clues to the content. In some picture books, there are no words at all.

The term "picture book" covers a wide range of materials from Mother

Goose pop-up books to those that support cognitive development, such as counting and alphabet books.

Some picture books address complex sociological issues. The Wall by Eve Bunting features the Vietnam Memorial and what it means to one family. In We are Down in the Dumps with Jack and Guy, Maurice Sendak uses two nursery rhymes and illustrations such as crumpled newspapers to reflect homelessness and poverty.

Other picture books, such as From Sailing With the Wind by Thomas Locker, offer impressionist style aesthetic qualities that motivate interest in art and beauty.

Some picture books highlight traditional folktales and fairy tales, while others provide exciting fonts and unusual formats to complement



poetry.

Some picture books, created especially for young readers, contain characters loved by young children such as the Cat in the Hat, created by Dr. Seuss, and Henry and Mudge, created by Cynthia Rylant.

Picture books are evaluated by professional staff in the Library District. This month, Francie Hurtado, storyteller for the "Mother Goose" and "Tales for Twos" groups at Rawlings Library, shares two lists of her favorite picture books for babies and small children. Please see the list at left and happy reading.
