# **Rawlings Library Meeting Rooms By Kathy Knox**

In a constantly busy and technology-driven it is increasingly important for people to be able to share physical space, to come together to meet, communicate ideas, explore new concepts, plan events, learn new things, and celebrate the good moments in life!

And what better place to meet than the centrally Robert located Hoag Rawlings Public Library, with its spacious rooms and open atmosphere?

Libraries are progressively fulfilling the role of community centers or hubs for urban areas. In response to this trend, the Rawlings Library has three rooms available for public use.

In one year, use of the rooms has grown by more than 40 percent. The word is getting out! Numerous nonprofit, private and government organizations meet at the library.

The Thurston Room on the first floor of the library is 530 square feet and holds 20 people with a table and chair set-up. The room holds 35 with chairs only. Light refreshments are allowed. This room is free to nonprofit organizations hosting an event open to the public. It costs \$25 per event for profit organizations or a non-profit organization event which is closed to the public.

The largest space, Meeting Room B, is also located on the first floor just beyond the Customer Service desk. The meeting room is 2,130 square feet and holds 80 people with tables and chairs. With chairs only, 140 can be accommodated. Light refreshments are allowed. Like the Thurston Room, there is no charge to nonprofit organizations hosting open meetings. For profit organizations or a non-profit organization with a closed event, it costs \$50.

The Ryals Special Events Room is located on the 4th floor and has balconies offering spectacular views of Pueblo. This 2,518 square foot room is quickly becoming a

popular choice for parties, reunions, weddings, business meetings.

It seats about 170 with banquet tables and chairs. Catering is welcome and there is a catering kitchen equipped with warming ovens, a refrigerator, a triple sink, and an ice maker.

The cost is \$250, Monday through Thursday, and \$300, Friday through Sunday. The Ryals Room requires security for events.

Equipment available for use includes dry erase boards, an overhead projector, TV/ VCR, stereo system and podium with speakers and a microphone.
